Introduction to Bullying

What is bullying?

Bullying is intentional, repeated behavior that aims to hurt or control another person, involving a power imbalance. It can be physical, verbal, social, or online, and often causes emotional or physical harm to the victim

Types of bullying: Physical, Verbal, Cyberbullying, Social Exclusion





South Korea's Approach to School Bullying

The School Violence Prevention Act in South Korea addresses and prevents school violence. It sets guidelines for reporting, investigating, and responding to incidents, with a focus on protecting students and supporting victims. The law involves schools, parents, and law enforcement to ensure a safe learning environment.



Key Features of the School Violence Prevention Act



- Mandatory reporting of bullying incidents
- School safety committees to handle cases
- Legal consequences for severe bullying behaviors
- Support systems for students affected by bullying
