WHAT IS OLLI?

OLLI is the acronym for the prestigious Osher Lifelong Learning Institute offered at 120+ Universities throughout the country. OLLI provides intellectual, social, and cultural enrichment opportunities in a climate that fosters friendship and a mutual sharing of ideas and life experiences.

MISSION

The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at the University of South Carolina Beaufort (USCB) is devoted to creating and sustaining a robust and thriving lifelong learning community specifically developed for adults 50 and older through intellectual and social programs.

WHY JOIN OLLI?

People who are active, engaged in their communities, and who continue learning throughout their lives feel more productive and purposeful, and are healthier and happier. Members share common bonds of intellectual curiosity and the experience of their generation. They are self-motivated learners, eager to share opinions, knowledge, and expertise with humor and mutual respect. OLLI offers opportunities to meet new friends, make contacts, and develop connections. In addition to lectures, members can attend social events, take field trips, and participate in a myriad of other short courses that better one's quality of life, providing a personal sense of health, engagement, and overall well-being.

WHO TEACHES THE COURSES?

HOW MUCH DOES IT COST?

Members can choose between an UNLIMITED or PAYGO option. Unlimited allows a member to take as many classes within that term as they wish for just \$125. PAYGO allows members to pay per class for just \$15. Summer classes are FREE for OLLI members.

*Upgrade to Unlimited at any time and apply already paid class fees to the upgrade.

*UNLIMITED (\$125) allows you to take as many live in-person, live on Zoom, and OLLI Digital Library courses as you wish throughout the term.

* Additional fee classes do not apply to an upgrade or the unlimited term fee.

Refund and Cancellation Policy

- OLLI annual memberships are non-refundable.
- All additional fee programs are assessed a \$10 cancellation fee anytime after payment.
- No credit for additional fee programs if cancellation is less than <u>5 business days</u> before the course/tour.
- PAYGO class fee (\$15) will not be credited to members account with less than 24 hours cancellation notice.
- Full forfeiture also applies to those members who do not show up for any enrolled course.

Art Deco and Art Moderne are two terms that are frequently used interchangeably, especially when referring to architecture. Learn why this is not accurate! Art Deco was a style of the late 1920s that was a product of the Roaring 20s. It was marked by warm colors and angular lines. Following the 1929 crash, businesses needed to "style" their products to look "modern" to encourage people to spend what little money they had. Designers turned to the airplanes and zeppelins of the period as inspiration for being "modern." Art Moderne was the result: curved, streamlined forms with cool color palettes.



Oliver is a former FBI-certified sniper, former FBIcertified firearms instructor, former undercover FBI task force officer, and former Deputy U.S. Marshal.

- Domestic Servitude: Where individuals are forced to work in private homes without pay.

This panel discussion will look at the scope of the issue in South Carolina and the Lowcountry. The state's tourism, agriculture, and transient population make it vulnerable to traffickers. According to recent reports, human trafficking incidents have been on the rise, affecting both adults and children.





Too many trees are being removed from our landscapes and too few are retained because of an irrational perception of the risks that they pose. Trees are multi-generational and mature trees are maintained in a different manner than their siblings. Pruning methods based on Conservation Arboriculture can keep them alive and stable for generations. This course will make educated arboricultural consumers out of its attendees.



MICHAEL MURPHY began arboriculture in 1972 and started Preservation Tree Care, Beaufort in 1993. He is a Board-Certified Master Arborist, one of eight in the State of SC and spends his free time repurposing wood into turned-bowls on a lathe.

GAR205: BUTTERFLIES AND THEIR GARDENS

Learn about butterfly gardens, the butterfly life cycle, butterfly behaviors, and native butterfly-friendly plants to include in your gardens. Through volunteering at the Coastal Discovery Museum, Lori took care of various butterflies through all life stages. Lori's approach to gardening focuses on native and pollinator-friendly plants.

PETER PASQUALE spent 33 years in the FAA as an air traffic controller, supervisor, and manager. Post-retirement he was an instructor for the University of Oklahoma teaching air traffic control at the FAA Academy in Oklahoma City.

The role of the Beaufort District in early revolutionary undertakings is also examined.

He is the owner of Legacy Leadership and Legacy History Tours of the Lowcountry. Rich serves on the Lowcountry Civil War Roundtable and Board of the Friends of Honey Hill.

HIS202: "PAYNE-FUL" BUSINESS: CHARLESTON'S JOURNEY OF TRUTH

He uncovers the humanity hidden beneath the detached descriptions as Seidler's family sold them. MICHAEL REYNOLDS is Bluffton born and raised. Michael founded the "Bluffton History" Facebook group, formerly known as "You Know You're from Bluffton When" and has since done countless hours of historical research and recorded interviews with some of Bluffton's older residents all to preserve Bluffton history.

HIS227: CIVIL WAR PRISON: ANDERSONVILLE

1 Session | Thursday | Feb 27 | 3-4:30PM | Zoom only From February 1864 until the end of the American Civil War in April 1865, Andersonville, Georgia served as the site of a notorious Confederate military prison. The prison at Andersonville, officially called Camp Sumter, was the South's largest prison for captured Union soldiers. Learn about this infamous military prison from Park Ranger Teri Surber.

TERI SURBER is one of the park rangers who conduct a variety of interpretive programs to encourage the development of a deeper understanding of American history and to broaden public support for preserving park resources. Interpretive rangers at Andersonville present the story of American prisoners of war to visitors.

HIS205: SCHEMES, WHIMS, AND PROJECTS OF ELIZA PINCKNEY

HIS207: BUT WHO WERE THE ESCAMACU

This course will discuss what the Indigenous world during Hilton Head's colonial history looked like. After the Spanish invasion of the Port Royal Sound between 1521 and 1587, Native people from here to the Caribbean experienced what archaeologists called societal shattering. This talk will explain what happened to the people who lived here first, who and why the Yamasee moved here at the end of the 1600s, and how their time ended in one of the bloodiest conflicts in American history nobody knows about.

She has a BS in Archaeological Science from the State University of New York at Potsdam and an MA and Ph.D. from Binghamton University.



Two of his great-grandsons, Daniel and Thomas Heyward, established rice plantations in the Old House area (now Ridgeland, Jasper County) in the South Carolina Lowcountry. Thomas Heyward, Jr, signer of the Declaration of Independence, contributed

signer of the Declaration of Independence, contributed heavily to American history during the Revolutionary War, serving in several key battles in the South.



TOM MIKELL, Attorney at Law, Citadel graduate with BA in history, University of South Carolina School of Law, Juris Doctorate, has extensive experience handling all aspects of quiet title and heirs' property litigation. He is a featured history and law presenter to Beaufort organizations.

HIS211: HISTORY OF THE GULLAH

1 Session | Thursday | April 24 | 1:00-3:00PM In-Person | Beaufort campus

This class will explore the immigration of the Gullah-Geechee people from the Ivory Coast of Western Africa. The newly enslaved traveled along the Middle Passage with British slave traders in cramped slave ships to Gadsden Wharf in Charleston. The Gullah were highly skilled in growing rice, a complicated and laborintensive crop, and developed Lowcountry plantations. Wayward bondsmen were punished under the Black Code and brought to Charleston from Barbados by the founders of Charles Town. Fearing slave uprisings, the "Sugar House" meted out brutal beatings and torture to maintain order. Meanwhile, planters and those who fulfilled their needs lived in luxury, mimicking European gentry. Their wealth reached new heights when Sea Island cotton became the principal cash crop worth 5 to 7 times more than other varieties of cotton. The timing was just right for England's industrial revolution and the soaring textile industry.



JOSIE OLSVIG is a new Southern author who has written extensively about the Gullah culture and the Civil War. She has researched the Gullah/Geechee culture extensively for nearly 12 years. She has interviewed local Gullahs and historians and performed archival research at plantations, libraries, museums, archives, and historic sites from Charleston to Washington, DC.

HIS212: LIGHTHOUSES AND THE HUNTING ISLAND LIGHTHOUSE 2 Sessions | Mondays | April 28, May

This course has a twofold focus - an introduction to lighthouses and the history of our local Hunting Island Lighthouse. In the first session, we will cover lighthouse history, lighthouse administration in the U.S., why lighthouses were important and still are, and a description of lighthouse structures and equipment. Most importantly, we will discuss the lighthouse keepers, their families, and their lives at a light station. In the second session, we will cover the Hunting Island Lighthouse history, including the first lighthouse (1855-1861) and the second lighthouse (1873-1933) and its current role at the State Park.



THEODORE (TED) PANAYOTOFF is a retired naval officer and armament research and development engineer for the United States Army. He has been a lighthouse enthusiast, researcher, author, and preservationist for more than 30 years. Ted is a member of several national, regional, and state lighthouse organizations.

Discover how America was only one relatively compact and insignificant theater of war in what was, in reality, a World War for England, fought on four fronts with dozens of countries involved, and that American independence was won only due to military aid from two main European powers and the distractions provided by four other major nations.

John Malcolm of Boston is the most notable and celebrated victim of Tarring and Feathering but certainly not the only one.

These missions filled a vital role in the United States, alongside male pilots. Their work advanced the war effort by freeing experienced male pilots to move to the front.



AMY GRAY is retired from the United States Army, where she served 25 years including two combat tours in Afghanistan with a Bronze Star. She is a military historian with expertise in areas that include women in the military, the Homefront, female pilots, and medical history. Amy earned a clinical doctorate at Virginia Commonwealth University, and she earned a Ph.D. from Military College.

HIS220: GETTYSBURG: SIDE STORIES TO THE MAIN EVENT

2 Sessions | Mondays | April 14 & 21 10:00AM-Noon | In-Person | Bluffton campus The epic 3-day clash in July 1863 provides the context for several human-interest stories and fascinating sidebars that bring the impact of Gettysburg down to a grassroots level. This course examines some of those stories and offers a fresh look at the great battle that cost a staggering 51,000 casualties in and around the crossroads Pennsylvania farming town of 2400 people.



JACK RABBITT's lifelong fascination with the American Civil War began at age 10. He has nurtured his understanding and insights into this defining period in our history through extensive research and battlefield visits. He has presented on business and history topics at OLLI for 15 years.

HIS221: FORGOTTEN BATTLES OF WORLD WAR II 2 Sessions | Wednesdays | Jan 22, 29 | 1-2:30PM

"Operation Nordwind" in the Alsace Lorraine area was a follow-on offensive in January 1945 following the Battle of the Bulge. This battle included several veteran Infantry Divisions that fought in Sicily and Italy as well as two "green" Armored Divisions which did not fare well against German SS Panzer Divisions. This American victory paved the way for the entry into southern Germany.

The program is based on interviews with combat veterans, several visits to the battlefields by the presenter, after-action reports, and period topo maps. Some "then and now" photo series of small unit actions are also featured during the series.



BILL COSGROVE is a graduate of both the University of Georgia and Clemson University. He retired from the U.S. EPA following a 35-year career in Athens, GA. He also served as an adjunct instructor at UGA for 32 years and has taught with OLLI programs at UGA, North Florida, and UNC Asheville since 2013.

HIS222: EYEWITNESS TO HISTORY: WORLD WAR ONE THROUGH 1968

You will hear about Jewish life in Poland, the Holocaust, Soviet Russia, the Ukrainian famine, Uzbekistan, and forced labor camps. One purpose of the memoir is to give survivors of human cruelty and injustice a voice so that successive generations understand what happened to their families and can seek justice. It also deals with the emotional burden and sense of isolation inherited by the children of Holocaust survivors.



SUZANNA EIBUSZYC, born in Poland and completed her BA at City College of NY and her MA at UCLA. Her classes with Elie Wiesel at CCNY convinced her of the importance of Holocaust survivors memoirs. Suzanna's book "Memory Is Our Home" is based on her mother's memoirs which were published in 2015.

HIS223: FRANKIN ROOSEVELT, GAMBIA, AND THE FORMATION OF THE UNITED NATIONS

In January 1943, U.S. President Franklin Roosevelt, on his way to Casablanca to meet with British Prime Minister Winston Churchill, stopped in Britain's West African colony of Gambia. The poverty and ill health he witnessed in "that hell-hole of yours" prompted Roosevelt to consider "an organization of United Nations "that would push to bring education, raise standards of living, and improve health conditions of the depressed colonial areas of the world." Explore the impact of this trip on Roosevelt's vision and its role in creating the United Nations.



DONALD WRIGHT, Distinguished Teaching Professor of History, Emeritus, SUNY-Cortland, has written books on African, African American, and Atlantic history. He has held Fulbright, NEH, and Rockefeller Foundation Fellowships and lectured at universities on four continents.

HIS224: MARCH TO VICTORY: ALLIED ACTIONS AFTER D-DAY

Following the success of D-Day, the Allies needed to liberate France before focusing on the Low Countries. This course examines key actions during this critical period in WWI, including the failed "Operation Market-Garden," the Battles of Aachen, the Huertgen Forest, and the Bulge, as well as the strategic importance of seizing bridges over the Rhine, particularly the Bridge at Remagen.

HIS228: GO FOR BROKE! THE 442ND REGIMENTAL COMBAT TEAM OLLI Digital Library recording available until May 31, 2025



The 442nd fought in some of the fiercest battles of WW II and became the highest decorated unit in the war. More than 12,000 Nisei (second-generation Japanese American) volunteers answered the call. Ultimately 2,686 from Hawaii and 1,500 from mainland U.S. internment camps assembled at Camp Shelby, Mississippi in April 1943 for a year of infantry training. The unit's motto was "Go for Broke"



COL (Ret) LAWRENCE SAUL served for 37 years in the U.S. Army. He was one of the last veterans of the Vietnam War still serving on active duty when he retired in 2008.Larry has taught more than 75 military history courses. He has extensive experience as a battlefield tour guide and has a B.A. in History from Georgia State University, as well as two master's degrees.

HIS225: DAY TRIP TO THE NATIONAL MUSEUM OF THE MIGHTY EIGHTH AIR FORCE

It would ultimately pit the longserving governor Sir William Berkelev with a young rebel named Nathaniel Bacon. From 1676-1677, Bacon's Rebellion would set Native American nations against each other, determine the fate of European servants and enslaved Africans, destroy the capital, damage trade, and benefit a few roques who played both sides. The consequences would shape the American Revolution to come.

HIS226: NOT A REAL ENEMY: THE TRUE STORY OF A HUNGARIAN JEWISH MAN'S FIGHT FOR FREEDOM

Almost half a million Jewish Hungarians are deported to Auschwitz. Among the few surviving Hungarian Jews from this era were young men who, like Ervin Wolf, were forced into the brutal Labor Service where they were cut off from the outside world and forced to endure inhumane brutalities and servitude. Once freed, a new oppression took hold as communist rule under Stalin turned friends into foes, enveloped the nation in fear and suspicion, and tested everyone's character and strength.

This is the true story of Ervin Wolf and his family as the fascist tide of Eastern Europe takes hold of Hungary. From the Wolfs' comfortable upper-class life to imprisonment, daring escapes, tragic deaths, cloak-and-dagger adventures, and Ervin's final escape to freedom in the dead of night, Robert Wolf will talk about his family's tale of suspense, tragedy, comedy, and ultimately, triumph.



ROBERT WOLF, M.D., grew up in a suburb of Detroit as the only child of Ervin and Judit Wolf. Their stories of their escape from communist Hungary, and his father's tragic history of escaping the Nazis twice but losing his parents at Auschwitz, inspired Robert to document his parents' tales and share those stories with Jewish groups and others throughout the United States.



SCI200: UNDERSTANDING GENES - HOW THEY WORK, MODIFICATION AND IMPROVING LIVES 2 Sessions | Monday, Wednesday | Feb 3, 5 | 1-2:30PM In-Person | Bluffton campus

This two part course explores advances in

genetics, focusing on gene editing technology (CRISPR) and its implications. Science knew almost nothing about genetics until the discovery of DNA about 80 years ago. Part II examines practical applications, including gene technology in treating genetic diseases, the role of mRNA in vaccine development, and how genetics influence behavior and personality.



Dr. COLIN MOSELEY did his medical training at McGill University and joined the orthopedics department at the University of Toronto. He later moved to Los Angeles to become the Chief Surgeon at the Shriners Hospital for Children and a Clinical Professor at UCLA.

SCI201: THE STORIES IN OUR SOLAR SYSTEM AND STARS

SPO200: HOW MAJOR LEAGUE **BASEBALL CAME TO BE**

Beginning with the founding myths of the game of baseball in the United States, Galvan will take a look at how the professional game developed into the big business of Major League Baseball. We'll explore the creation of the National Association, the National and American Leagues, the infamous "reserve clause" which allowed owners to sign a player and retain his rights forever and the establishment of the color line, which kept black players out of professional baseball. The Negro Leagues were born as a result, allowing black players a space to play and shine. We'll meet Babe Ruth, Ty Cobb, Josh Gibson and many of the other stars of the first 30 years of baseball.

In 1947, Jackie Robinson stepped on the field to play his first game for the Brooklyn Dodgers, breaking the color barrier and opening the doors for black athletes to play professional baseball. The reserve clause saw its demise in the 1970s, opening the door for baseball's mega-contracts. The course will conclude with a look at how the game has become the big business it is today and its evolution into an international spectacle, fueled by Latin American and Asian stars.



RAUL GALVAN, Ph.D. has been a baseball fan since the 1950s when his father took him to his first Winter League baseball game in Havana, Cuba. He has taught Sports and Society in Latin America and the United States at the University of Wisconsin Milwaukee and has worked hundreds of Major League baseball television broadcasts.






