WAYS TO ENGAGE

In-Person: OLLI has designated classrooms on all USCB campuses. Most courses are held in person.

Look for the In-Person designation listed next to each course on the course pages or on the In-Person summary page.

Live On Zoom: Many courses that are in person on campus are also offered simultaneously on Zoom.

OLLI offers tech support for members who want to get the most out of their Zoom experience.

On-Demand: The majority of OLLI courses are recorded and added to the On-Demand library.

This allows members who chose the "Unlimited Term Fee" the option to view classes, on their own time, as many times as they choose, through June 1, 2022. You do not have to register to watch a class On-Demand.

Each course listing states if the course is In-Person, on Zoom and/or On-Demand.


YOUR ROAD MAP ∽ to Enjoying Your OLLI Program

STARTING POINT: Make sure your Membership is current. Enjoy benefits year-round, even if you do not take courses in the Fall or Winter/Spring terms. Cost: \$40 for 365 days upon joining or renewing.

THE ROAD AHEAD ~ DECISION TIME

TERM PARTICIPATION: If you'd like to engage in courses during the Winter/Spring term, your next decision is to choose between the following.



• **UNLIMITED** – take as many courses as you like, including in-person on campus, Zoom and/or On-Demand for \$125. **Pre-paying the Unlimited term fee is required before registering for OLLI courses.**

CHOOSING YOUR LEARNING PLATFORM - HYBRID COURSE SELECTION

A. In-Person – courses held in a classroom or at an off-site location, sign in upon arrival.

- **B. On Zoom** For optimal Zoom experience, create a Zoom account. Learn how to put your first and last name or last initial on your screen so OLLI staff can check attendance. When taking an OLLI course through Zoom, it is different than physically sitting in the classroom. Example: you may not always see the instructor if they walk outside of the camera's view.
- **C. On-Demand OLLI Library** Watch OLLI courses throughout the term that have been recorded. This benefit is available to members who signed up for UNLIMITED.

HOW TO REGISTER FOR THE WINTER/SPRING TERM

A. Online registration site: www.olli.uscb.edu

If you are brand new to OLLI, you will need to create an account by clicking new member. If you are or have ever been a member of USCB OLLI you have an online OLLI account, please enter your email address associated with OLLI and password.

- **UNLIMITED** Pre-pay your unlimited term fee of \$125 **before** adding any courses. Once payment is complete, log back into your account and sign up for courses anytime throughout the term. Courses that have vendor fees (for supplies) will be an additional cost.
- **PAYGO** Add your courses to your cart (\$15 for each course that you choose). Courses that have vendor fees (for supplies) will only be charged the vendor fee, the course fee is waived.
- **B. Mail** Send your completed registration form with payment to USCB OLLI, One University Blvd. Hargray 161, Bluffton SC 29909
- **C. Phone** Call the OLLI office at 843-208-8247. Have your course selection and payment ready.



- You will receive a course reminder e-mail before each of your courses. These e-mails will also have important details such as handouts, location details, and the Zoom link. Please READ them.
- Always sign in for your class at the registration desk outside the classroom. If on Zoom, make sure your full name or your first name and the first initial of your last name is showing on your screen so that staff can take attendance.

FINISH LINE: Fill out a course evaluation for each of your courses. As an OLLI member, your feedback is key for both curriculum planning and the instructors who volunteer to share their expertise and passion. The OLLI course evaluation link is the same throughout the term and is provided in each class reminder email and placed in the Zoom chat room for each Zoom class. http://olli-zoom.uscb.edu/course_evaluation.

ART200: SALVADOR DALÍ

1 Session | Tuesday | February 22 | 2PM-3:30PM | In-Person, On-Demand | Hilton Head campus

Known throughout the world as a great artist, self-publicist, and showman, this combination was an irresistible formula of success for this most intriguing Spanish-born character, whose long span career as a leading artist took on numerous different forms. Delving deep into what made Dalí click and the contributions he made to the art world will leave you to conclude your own interpretation. Did he have the makings of being a total madman or was he just pure genius?

ART201Z: HISTORY OF MODERN ART

6 Sessions | Thursday | March 3, 10, 17, 24, 31, April 7 | 10AM-11:30AM | Zoom, On-Demand

Beginning with Impressionism and continuing with Post-Impressionism we will look at the ideas and artists who sowed the seeds of modernism in Paris. We will then consider early modern art including the Russian Modernists, Cubism, and the beginnings of abstraction. We will conclude this 100-year survey with Abstract Expressionism.



NANCY McAFEE is an art historian who spent 18 years at the Cleveland Museum of Art as an educator and community outreach director. She has an AB from Cornell and a MA in art history from Case Western Reserve University. She teaches at Rochester Institute of Technology's Osher and has four grandchildren in Rochester and four in San Francisco.

ART202: SCAD MUSEUM AND SCAD STORY TOUR

2 Sessions | Monday, March 21 - 10AM-12N, Bluffton campus | Thursday, March 24 - 11AM-2PM Bluffton campus and Offsite (*Savannah*)

Session 1 (Monday, March 21, 10AM - 12N) Learn the history of how SCAD came to Savannah and how this world-famous art and design school and museum has changed both the landscape and the cultural direction of the city in the USCB OLLI classroom.

Session 2 (Thursday, March 24, 11AM-2PM) Participants will travel (drive or walk) to Poetter Hall for a showing of the SCAD story followed by a visit to the ever-changing SCAD museum for a tour of the artwork from all over the world, which is there to inspire SCAD students in their creative endeavors and disciplines. There will be time for lunch. Participants can pack a lunch or purchase a box lunch. \$8 museum fee will be due to SCAD on the day of the tour.

ART203: SENTIMENTAL STRANDS, THE ART OF VICTORIAN HAIR ART

1 Session | Tuesday | March 22 | 2PM-4PM | In-Person only | Beaufort campus

This class addresses the Victorian-era influence on some of the sentimental traditions of today, specifically those using hair. Friendship albums, hair work, and mourning practices are discussed. In addition, guests will have the opportunity to peruse authentic 19th-century displays of hair work, mourning pieces, and friendship albums. Kim Poovey demonstrates Victorian-era hair work used to create the elaborate hair wreaths of the time. Take a sentimental journey to the past and discover the origins of some of today's most nostalgic rituals.



KIM POOVEY is a storyteller, historic re-enactor, author, and school psychologist. She portrays personas, including Jane Austen/Regency era, Emma Victoria Brown/ Victorian era (the main character from her novel, *Truer Words*), Julia Taylor of the Titanic/Edwardian era, among others. She creates her vintage clothing and uses collected period pieces for her presentations.

ART204: EXPLORING THE ARTS ON THE USCB BEAUFORT CAMPUS

1 Session | Thursday | April 14 | 9:30AM-3:30PM | In-Person only | Beaufort campus

Tour the ceramics, printmaking, and Harrington Street studios at the USCB Beaufort campus with demonstrations of techniques and projects in those studios by Assistant Professor of Art, Joanna Angell. Meet the soon-to-be graduates of USCB's Studio Art program at the Sea Island Center Gallery for a sneak preview of their exhibition and hear several artists talk about the work they are presenting. There will be about a 90-minute break for lunch on your own.



JOANNA ANGELL, USCB Assistant Professor, is a fourth-generation artist working in ceramics, printmaking, drawing, and painting. She holds an MFA from the University of Georgia where she studied lithography with Tamarind printmaker, Charles Morgan and ceramics with Ron Meyers.

BUS200: BY THE NUMBERS (BTN) - MONTHLY ECONOMIC NEWS YOU CAN USE

4 Sessions | Wednesday | January 26, February 23, March 30, April 27 | 10AM-11:30AM In-Person, On-Demand | Bluffton campus

These monthly sessions will provide a fast-paced tour "by the numbers" in descriptive graphics of select local, state, national, and international economic and business news; and factors shaping that news. Each session will provide baseline economic information, but also vary focus monthly on other topical information affecting economic and business activity. What appears to be emergent trends in science, technology, health/medical, industry, trade, government/ policy/taxation, and more will be sampled and put into perspective relating to the quality of one's current and future life.

BUS202: FATE OF NATIONS-FACTORS IN THEIR RISE, FALL...AND RISE AGAIN

2 Sessions | Wednesday | February 9, 16 | 10AM-12N | In-Person, Zoom, On-Demand | Bluffton campus

Throughout history, nations rise and have fallen based on economic performance. Economics is affected by population, resource and oceanic access, geography and climate, governance, transparency, social/cultural norms, geopolitics, and more. This presentation will examine such factors in the rise and fall of great nations from antiquity to the present and discuss surprising forecasts about winners and losers in the 21st century. Globalization is driving nations toward economic convergence and prosperity. Geopolitics and polarization within and among nations are compounding effects of climate change and information in fracturing nations and tribalizing societies, and threatening their economic growth. This course includes some speculation about future alignments for economic progress and collective security among the great nations.



GREG BLACKBURN, CAPT USN(Ret) has degrees in physics, control theory, and computer systems. He served 30 years in Naval Cryptology and Intelligence, and 20+ years in the US defense industry. He brings perspectives from operations analysis, technology, economics, history, and geostrategy to this presentation.

ECO201: LOWCOUNTRY 101

The breathtaking beauty and wildlife of the Lowcountry are undeniable but very few of us are from here. So, what do we need to know? This interactive, question and answer presentation will share the basics of the Lowcountry eco-systems from the salt marsh to the forest and everything in between. Presenter Jill Moore's passion is to share her knowledge and love of this area, so students have a better understanding of this truly unique environment.



JILL MOORE, Master Naturalist, has a background in education and is the owner and creator of *Moore to Life*. Her love of the outdoors started young while spending the summers of her youth in Montana where her parents are from. In search of a place full of outdoor adventure to raise her three boys, Jill's family ended up in the

Lowcountry of South Carolina. Sharing what she has learned and experienced in this area "like no other place on earth" is what she hopes to share with others through these educational opportunities.

ECO202: DEEP SEA WORLD

1 Session | Thursday | February 3 | 1PM-2:30PM | In-Person, Zoom | Beaufort campus

The deep sea is the largest environment on earth, yet we have only explored ~5% of this extreme habitat. Characterized by crushing pressures, darkness, and frigid temperatures, the deep sea is home to truly bizarre creatures, including glass sponges that live for 18,000 years. Join Dr. Mercer Brugler for a visual survey of deep-sea denizens.

Williamson is currently a scientist in residence at St. Mary's Anglican Girls School in Perth, Western Australia, where he teaches

and advises on marine science education and research. He is vice-president of the Mingan Island Cetacean Study and was a pioneer in Massachusetts whale research as the founder and director of the Pelagic Systems Research & Massachusetts Whale Watch, which began studying cetaceans in Massachusetts Bay in 1976.

ECO209: ST. PHILLIPS ISLAND SAFARI

Nestled between expansive estuaries and the Atlantic Ocean, this incredible barrier island ripples with old growth maritime forests and a variety of wildlife like fox squirrels, alligators, and bald eagles. Purchased from media mogul Ted Turner in 2017, this incredible island is one of South Carolina's newest state parks, a National Natural Landmark, and under easement with The Nature Conservancy. From the Hunting Island Nature Center, you will take a tram down to the ferry where you will join your naturalist for a 45-minute interpretive boat ride through the vast estuaries between Hunting Island and St. Phillips Island. Once you arrive at St.



Phillips you will board another tram that takes you on a safari-style ride through the interior of the park and allows you to learn about the unique features of St. Phillips from your guide. From there you'll have two hours of free time where you can either join the naturalist for an interpretive hike or explore the island on your own. There will be a tram service provided back to the dock where you'll catch the boat to take you back to Hunting Island. Pack a lunch and be prepared for walking on uneven terrain, climbing steps into and out of the boat, as well as unpredictable weather. To maximize your experience on the island, we recommend you bring plenty of water and snacks, a raincoat, bug spray and sunscreen, good walking shoes, light layers with long sleeves and pants, binoculars, and a camera. A \$5 parking fee will be collected the day of the tour if you do not have a South Carolina State Park access tag. Vendor Fee \$90

ECO210: ACE BASIN/BEAR ISLAND WILDLIFE TOUR

HIS200Z: MODERN, POST-MODERN, AND CONTEMPORARY ARCHITECTURE

This course will examine the major architectural styles of the past century, beginning with their roots in the aftermath of the industrial revolution and moving into the future of architecture in the 21st century. Following behind was post-modern architecture, a reaction against the austerity, formality, and lack of variety in modern architecture. Contemporary architecture is the architecture of the 21st century, where no single style is dominant, with architects working in multiple styles. All three had a direct influence on the buildings in which we live and work today.

HIS209: THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION IN OUR NATIONAL PARK SYSTEM

Over 30 of our 423 National Park Service sites have a direct connection to the American Revolution. DAVID KROESE is one of about 50 people known to have visited all 400+ National Park Service units in December 2017. David has spent thousands of hours exploring our park system, logging over 1,500 NPS site visits. David shares his enthusiasm for our park system in speaking engagements across the country, lectures on park-related

themes in programs at over a dozen colleges and universities, and is currently working on his next book, *Hidden Gems of America's National Park System*.

HIS210: HOW THE "ARSENAL OF DEMOCRACY" WON WORLD WAR II

From the retired Army General who brought you 9/11, Rising China, Vietnam to Today, and West Point Trivia comes this new presentation based on Arthur Herman's book *Freedom's Forge*. Tom Brokaw called the heroes who fought in World War II, The Greatest Generation, but none of their success would have been possible without the historic mobilization of American industry. From a war-weary, isolationist country coming out of the Great Depression, hear how the buildup began eight months before Pearl Harbor, then was sustained throughout the war, not just for American forces, but for all the allies.



CRAIG WHELDEN, retired Major General, spent 30 years in the U.S. Army and another nine as a member of the Senior Executive Service (SES) with the U.S. Marine Corps. Along the way, he led thousands of soldiers, sailors, and marines at each level from Lieutenant to General Officer to Senior Executive – with 10 years in Europe and another 12 in the Pacific.

HIS211: THE BATTLE OF HONEY HILL

1 Session | Tuesday | March 1 | 10-11:30AM | In-Person, Zoom, On-Demand | Hilton Head campus

The Battle of Honey Hill was the third battle of Sherman's March to the Sea and a diversionary attempt by federal forces to prevent reinforcements from Charleston to reach Savannah by railroad. Ultimately, in defenses approximately 1.5 miles east of today's Ridgeland, SC, over 1,500 Confederate troops held off nearly 6,000 soldiers, sailors, and marines of the Union's hastily assembled Coastal Division. Discover how, despite valiant, repeated attempts by US Colored Troops regiments to break Rebel lines, the Union command's mismanagement of resources enabled the third to the last significant Confederate victory of the Civil War. Also, learn how the preservation of the critical railroad connection in November 1864 allowed the war to continue more than 100 days longer than it might have if the Federal troops had prevailed.



RICH THOMAS, the owner of Legacy Leadership and Legacy History Tours of the Lowcountry, operating as Hilton Head History Tours, is a founding member of the Hilton Head Island Institute, a former Board member of the Heritage Library, the Santa Elena Foundation, and the Lowcountry Civil War Roundtable. Rich is the

founder and President of the Board of the Friends of Honey Hill, and a Co-Chair of the South Carolina American Revolution Sestercentennial Commission's Committee of 99 for Beaufort District.

HIS212: TUSCARORA JACK BARNWELL AND HIS FIGHT TO SAVE THE ENGLISH COLONIES

Between 1711 and 1728, uprisings by two Indian tribes, the Yemassee and the Tuscaroras, threatened to drive the English colonies from North and South Carolina. This course will examine the key role played by Col. John "Tuscarora Jack" Barnwell in preserving the settlements in Beaufort, Charles Town, and North Carolina.



JOHN WARLEY is a graduate of The Citadel and University of Virginia School of Law, author of five novels and one non-fiction history of The Citadel. He wrote the Beaufort History Museum's exhibit on Reconstruction now on display at the Old Beaufort Firehouse.

HIS213: DAY TRIP TO MIGHTY EIGHTH NATIONAL MUSEUM

1 Session | Friday | March 4 | 10AM-2PM | Offsite (Savannah)

Travel via coach bus to the Mighty Eighth National Museum 30 minutes from Bluffton for a day touring the museum, lunch, and a special program highlighting the POW exhibit. This national museum's mission is to preserve for all Americans the stories of courage, character, and patriotism displayed by the men and women of the Eighth Air Force from World War II to the present. Eighty years ago on January 28, 1942, the Eighth Air Force was created in Savannah, GA. The Eighth had 7 men and no airplanes when it moved to England to help defeat Nazi Germany. It offers an entertaining look at castles, which served as both home and fortress to certain classes of the Middle Ages, and profiles the history of 44, including Bodiam Castle and Leeds Castle, two of the most photographed castles in the world, which Jack has explored in person.



JACK RABBITT has been teaching at OLLI for 12 years and has entertained hundreds of members with his enthusiastic, energetic, and informative presentations on a variety of business topics, the Civil War, European castles, and religion.

HIS216: THE LARGEST ART HEIST IN HISTORY!

1 Session | Monday | March 14 | 10AM-12N | In-Person, Zoom, On-Demand | Hilton Head campus

The largest art heist in the world did not take place in Paris, London, or Stockholm, but here in the US, in Boston, Massachusetts, at the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum. Famous works of art by Rembrandt, Vermeer, Manet, Degas, and other international artists were stolen. This class examines how the thieves gained access to the museum; why thieves steal art (it is NOT what you expect); the years-long investigative efforts by international law enforcement organizations; the suspects and the status of the robbery investigation.



STEVE EMERY has more than 40 years of experience in the healthcare medical and diagnostics industry. He has a keen interest in history, providing little-known stories about major events (e.g., WASP of WWII), and technology (e.g., Dutch Delta Works).

HIS217: THE IDEA OF A SOUTHERN NATION

2 Sessions | Tuesday, Thursday | March 15, 17 | 10AM-12N | In-Person, Zoom, On-Demand | Beaufort campus

The founders created a "more perfect Union" in 1787. But that Union was in many ways incomplete, its limits imprecisely defined, and its meaning yet to be worked out. In the beginning, as the poet Robert Frost has written, the United States was "still unstoried, artless, unenhanced." Though independence had been secured, the course of nationhood was a quest for nationality, and that quest represents a central theme in American history. This course will examine how American nationhood came to be defined and how Northern and Southern definitions found, first, coherent expression, and then ultimately led to civil war.



DR. JOHN McCARDELL served from 2010-2020 as Vice-Chancellor and President Emeritus of The University of the South, Sewanee, Tennessee, where he remains a member of the history faculty. From 1976-2010 he was a member of the faculty at Middlebury College and served as President from 1991-2004. He has had a residence in Beaufort since 2004 and taught with OLLI 2004-2010. His book *The Idea of a Southern Nation* (Norton) won the Allan Nevins Prize. He has published extensivelyin

the field of southern history.

HIS218Z: DISORGANIZED CRIME: MOTORIZED BANDITS AND RISE OF THE FBI

During the 18 months from mid-1933 to the end of 1934, a crime wave swept the Midwest and made John Dillinger and Pretty Boy Floyd household names. The FBI, led by J. Edgar Hoover, waged an all-out war on the bandits and thus emergedthe FBI. In this course, we will review the myths and legends of this period.

HIS219: THE COAST GUARD'S FINEST HOURS

The fascinating story of the Coast Guard's most daring rescues will be told here. On February 18, 1952, two T2 tankers broke in half off the coast of Chatham, Massachusetts during a fierce nor'easter storm. This is the true story of the thrilling rescues of the sailors aboard the SS Fort Mercer and the SS Pendleton. The latter was the basis for the 2016 movie, "The Finest Hours."



JACK A FRISCH, Ph.D., is a retired professor of anthropology. He has done fieldwork among several Native American groups as well as laboratory fieldwork with other cultures. His focus has been on ethnological fieldwork, ethnos linguistics, and ethnos history.

HIS220: U.S. AND FOREIGN SUBMARINES FROM WWII TO PRESENT

There were significant advances in U.S. and foreign submarine technology and weaponry from WWII to the present day. This class explores these topics using videos, animations, photos, and interviews with crew members who sailed in them.

HIS221: HOW MANY PEOPLE IS TOO MANY?

This course will survey the long history of the growth of the human population locally, nationally, and globally. It will analyze the causes of that growth and occasional decline. We will examine

published alarms about the dangers of continuing population growth and contrast those alarms with voices asserting more people mean an improving life for all. We will report the history of immigration into the USA and review the pros and cons of allowing more. Regarding environmental impacts, we will ask where on earth population growth is most harmful. Lastly, we will survey government policies that try to influence birth rates, of which China's one-child policy was perhaps the most radical.



RAYMOND DOMINICK, Ph.D., taught western civilization for 30 years at The Ohio State University. He authored two books: one, a biography of the founder of Germany's Social Democratic party, and the other, surveying the history of the environmental movement in Germany.

HIS222: SIGNIFICANT WWII AMERICAN AND FOREIGN BOMBER AIRCRAFT

1 Session | Tuesday | March 29 | 1PM-3PM | In-Person, Zoom, On-Demand | Beaufort campus

Major advances in bomber aircraft technology occurred before and during WWII. This presentation includes 12 bomber planes, including the American B-17, the British Lancaster, the Japanese Betty, and the German Stuka. Their design objectives, strengths, weaknesses, and the tactics used in flying them will be explored through a variety of media including photos, films, videos, animations, and pilot interviews.

Learn about the legend of King Dataw and the proprietary period leading to the antebellum plantation era of indigo and Sea Island cotton. Explore the preserved land which the National Register of Historic Places calls "the most complete example of a 19th century Sea Island cotton plantation in the country."

HIS224: HISTORY WALKING TOUR OF THE BEAUFORT NATIONAL CEMETERY

1 Session | Tuesday | April 5 | 1PM-3PM | Offsite (Beaufort)

Step back in time to hear the story of the Beaufort National Cemetery, one of 155 national cemeteries in the United States. Established as a National Cemetery in 1863 by President Abraham Lincoln, there are nearly 24,000 interred in this beautifully landscaped veteran's cemetery. The cemetery contains a cross-section of veterans from every major conflict since the Seminole Wars. Along with two Medal of Honor winners, some of the other notable persons buried in the National Cemetery are Colonel Benjamin Vandervoort, Colonel Donald Conroy "The Great Santini," Sergeant Charles (Chuck) Taliano - the Rose Garden Marine, and 19 soldiers from the Massachusetts 55th all-black volunteer infantry. Included will be a talk on the cemetery history, orientation of the grounds, and a walking tour of some of the notable gravesites and

monuments. Maps and self-guided tour booklets will be provided for further exploration on your own.

JOE DORMAN, Retired USAF, has been with Veterans Affairs since December 2008 and is a member of the NCA Organizational Assessment and Improvement Team. Dorman was a part of the construction of the Fort Jackson National Cemetery before joining the Beaufort National Cemetery in 2017.

HIS225: TOUR HISTORIC FORT FREMONT - HOMELAND SECURITY C. 1898

1 Session | Monday | April 11 | 10AM- 12N | Offsite (St. Helena Island)

Located on St. Helena Island, Fort Fremont was one of the most sophisticated defense structures of its time. Built during the Spanish-American War, Fort Fremont's story is a reflection of our nation at the turn of the 20th century explosive growth in military technology, rising international tensions, and the emergence of the U.S. as a global power. Participants will visit Beaufort County's newly completed History Center where they will view a documentary, see a diorama of the Fort as it stood in 1900, and take a walking tour of the Fort.

DR. RAYMOND ROLLINGS, DENNIS CANNADY, and **TED PANAYOTOFF** (AKA Sgt. Ted) will conduct the class. They are long-time Friends of Fort Fremont, historians, passionate preservationists, experienced docents, and skilled miniaturists.

HIS226: RMS TITANIC - BEFORE SHE SAILED

1 Session | Wednesday | April 13 | 1PM-3PM | In-Person, Zoom, On-Demand | Bluffton campus

RMS Titanic was viewed as the crowning achievement of the industrial revolution - the engineering marvel of her time. Her construction and launch provided validity for man's belief in his ever-increasing supremacy over nature. It is common knowledge the Titanic struck an iceberg and sank in the arctic waters off Newfoundland, Canada. This presentation, however, will cover the chain of events and decisions that brought the Titanic into existence, long before that fateful night.

MARK CALLEN has had a lifelong interest in warships and sea battles. He has held OLLI sessions on the Civil War at Sea, the Monitor and the Merrimac, and the Titanic.

HIS227: A CHAUTAUQUA EXPERIENCE - EDITH RUSSELL TITANIC SURVIVOR (1879-1975)

1 Session | Wednesday | April 13 | 4PM-5:30PM | In-Person, On-Demand | Bluffton campus

This Chautauqua style course takes us to 1937, on the 25th anniversary of the Titanic's sinking. Edith Russell (1879-1975) was an American fashion buyer, stylist, and correspondent for "Women's Wear Daily", and best remembered for surviving the 1912 sinking of the RMS Titanic. We join Ms. Russell in 1937 as she speaks to us about that fateful night. Part 1: Edith Russell monologue, Part 2: Questions for Edith, still in the year 1937, Part 3: Meet Debra Conner, Q & A about studying EdithRussell.



DEBRA CONNER began portraying Edith Russell in 2013 as part of the Ohio Humanities summer Chautauqua tour. Her other characters include Emily Dickinson; Margaret Mitchell, author of "Gone with the Wind"; and Civil War surgeon, Dr. Mary Edwards Walker, the only woman ever to receive the Congressional Medal of Honor.

HIS228: BEAUFORT RIVER CRUISE

1 Session | Wednesday | April 20 | 3PM-5PM | Offsite (Beaufort)

Join a US Coast Guard certified master captain and a naturalist who will show you Beaufort, the way it was meant to be seen from the water. You'll gain an explorer's perspective on the incredible ecology of our estuaries and rivers that run between islands and see what some of the first explorers saw on the east coast. While looking for historical areas and monuments, keep an eye out for wildlife like osprey and bottlenose dolphins that also call Beaufort home. Be prepared for climbing steps into and out of the boat as well as unpredictable weather. We recommend light layers, a raincoat, sunscreen, binoculars, and a camera. HME200: STRESS! MAKE IT YOUR FRIEND

1 Session | Wednesday | February 2 | 10AM-11:30AM | In-Person, Zoom, On-Demand | Hilton Head campus

This class focuses on the biology of anxiety and stress. It will also provide practical skills and strategies for effectively managing anxiety and stress. This course is interactive, and students are invited to participate in the classroom or at home.



DEBI LYNES, Ph.D., explores the relationship between the physical environment and its influence on health and wellness.

HME201: UNDERSTANDING GENES, GENOME EDITING & ETHICAL DECISIONS

1 Session | Thursday | February 17 | 1PM-2:30PM | In-Person, Zoom, On-Demand | Hilton Head ampus

This course will review the basics of genome editing with thoughtful discussion related to the ethical implications of this evolving science. We knew almost nothing about genetics 100 years ago. Today, we have observed the unfolding of incredible discoveries related to genetic coding and DNA. DNA can replicate exact copies of itself in concert with the division of cells; and the two cells that merge to form a new being can share and re-distribute the genetic information from both parents. In the last decade, scientists have learned how to design and create DNA to produce more effective vaccines more rapidly. Science is now capable of tinkering with the essence of humanity, which raises important and difficult ethical questions. Is editing genes any different in principle than the breeding farmers have been doing for centuries? Is it OK to tinker with the genes of both plants and animals? To edit the genes of one person's body? What about corrected genetic defects that cause disease? Is it ethical to produce populations with characteristics that we need, like nurses, musicians, and soldiers?



DR. COLIN MOSELEY did his medical training at McGill University and joined the Orthopedics Department at the University of Toronto. He later moved to Los Angeles to become the Chief Surgeon at the Shriners Hospital for Children and a Clinical Professor at UCLA. Throughout his career, he has been devoted to teaching.

HME202: PALLIATIVE CARE AND HOSPICE CARE 101

With end-of-life care and patients' wishes becoming all the buzz in the medical spotlight, it is important to understand the myths and realities of "dirty words." What are hospice and palliative care? What are the choices as you begin to navigate aging and the medical system? Do you

know what questions you should be asking? This course will be upbeat and focus on living while learning about palliative care, hospice care, and grief support. The difference between palliative and hospice care, grief support in our community, volunteer opportunities, and the upcoming hospice inpatient facility Caroline's Cottage will be part of the discussion by a group of Friends of Caroline experts.

HME203: HEALTHY POSTURE AND MOVEMENTS FOR STRUCTURAL INTEGRITY

HME205: MEMORY & AGING: THE SPECTRUM FROM NORMAL TO DEMENTIA

DR. PAUL MAZZEO is board-certified in neurology, practicing adult and pediatric neurology. He is the only neurologist in the Lowcountry certified in headache medicine and is one of only three neurologists in the state of SC certified in behavioral neurology and neuropsychiatry. Dr. Mazzeo has served as Chief of the

Medical Staff and Chair of Medicine at Beaufort Memorial Hospital. He is the Medical Director of the Beaufort Memorial Memory Center and the Beaufort Memorial Acute Rehabilitation Unit.

HME206: THE BIOLOGY OF CANCER

4 Sessions | Tuesday | April 12, 19, 26, May 03 | 1PM-2:30PM | In-Person, Zoom, On-Demand | Beaufort campus

Cancer is a disease that touches the lives of most of us. Yet, most people understand little about how this disease begins, how it develops over time, and how and why it makes us sick. In this class, we will cover fundamental aspects of the biology of this disease. We will discuss the causes of human cancer, how the disease develops in people over time, and we will discuss the basis for the three arms of medical oncology: surgery, radiation, and chemotherapy. The course will conclude with a discussion about how new and emerging targeted therapies and immunotherapy hold promise for the eventual cure for cancer.



STEPHEN P. ETHIER, Ph.D. is a Professor in the Hollings Cancer Center at the Medical University of South Carolina. He has published over 140 papers on the biology of cancer over his 40-year career, and he has taught classes on the fundamentals of cancer biology to medical students, graduate students, medical residents, and post-

doctoral fellows both at MUSC and before that at the University of Michigan Medical School.

INTERNATIONAL STUDIES

IST200: IMPLICATIONS OF A RISING CHINA

1 Session|Tuesday|February 8|1PM-3PM| In-Person, Zoom, On-Demand | Hilton Head campus

With more than a dozen years in the Pacific, as an Army General Officer and a Senior Executive with the Marine Corps, Craig Whelden had a front-row seat to China's hegemonic activities and bullying of its neighbors. This course explores what is happening on the other side of the world: geopolitically, militarily, and economically as China expands its sphere of influence. Students will learn about the strategic importance of the Malacca Strait, the South China Sea, the exploding growth of the Peoples Liberation Army, and China's encroachment on the "second island chain," where the U.S. begins its day in Guam.



CRAIG WHELDEN, retired Major General, spent 30 years in the U.S. Army and another nine as a member of the Senior Executive Service (SES) with the U.S. Marine Corps. Along the way, he led thousands of soldiers, sailors, and marines at each level from Lieutenant to General Officer to Senior Executive – with 10 years in Europe and another 12 in the Pacific.

IST201: WHAT'S WRONG WITH AFRICA?

1 Session|Tuesday|February 15 | 10AM-12N | In-Person, Zoom, On-Demand | Beaufort campus

Throughout his teaching career, Donald Wright has been asked one question more than any other: "What's wrong with Africa?" African nations have many problems for which there don't seem to be good answers: political instability (most recently a coup in Sudan), ethnic struggle, government corruption, recurring famine, lack of medical care, poor schools, huge debt, and more. Also, basic things just don't often work. Why is this the case? In this lecture, Don tries to answer the question, based on 40 years of experience studying and teaching about the people of the continent and their history. In the end, he offers a few thoughts on what we, as good people caring about others living in difficult circumstances, might consider doing about it.

BRIAN CUDAHY, born and bred in Brooklyn, holds a Ph.D. in philosophy and teaches undergraduate courses at USCB. He has published widely on topics as diverse as the New York subways and religious history. 
