USCB Nursing Alumna On COVID-19 Frontlines

USCB alumna and COVID-19 crisis frontliner - Kristen McDonald, nursing class of 2019, is working overtime as a Neuroscience Intensive Care Unit (NSICU) nurse at Virginia Commonwealth University's medical center. Kristen has been on call 24/7, providing the utmost care and support to the most critical COVID-19 patients and others in need of life-sustaining measures. She credits USCB's BSN Program in preparing her to persevere during these unprecedented times. "My professors didn't sugarcoat how nursing would be. It's raw, it's emotional, but you know you have to stay strong for the patient and their family." She believes her clinical professors equipped her to handle tough situations right off the bat. "I definitely didn't know my first year as a nurse would be baptism by fire during a pandemic, but the resiliency and hard work that I developed in USCB's BSN Program is what's keeping me afloat."

USCB Alumna Danyelle Bozeman Wilson Inspires a Love of Learning During COVID-19

USCB Early Childhood Education alumna, Danyelle Bozeman Wilson, is teaching her Oakridge Elementary (Clover, SC) kindergartners in her at-home virtual classroom. USCB Study Abroad

Global Learning is considered a <u>High</u> <u>Impact Practice</u> by the Association of American Colleges and Universities. In the past 6 years, USCB has exponentially increased the Global Learning education. For 2019-2020, some 25 students from the Departments of Education and Public Health traveled to Finland, as well as two students to Netherlands for USCB's exchange program with HZ University of Applied Sciences in Vlissingen. These two students majored in Communications and Hospitality Management.

In addition, USCB students also traveled to other destinations for their global education in previous academic years: Nepal, France, United Kingdom, Ghana, Italy, Spain, Australia, Germany, Costa Rica, and Portugal.

The QEP for USCB focuses on improving students' learning by providing experiential education rooted in community issues. "Students Connected: Fieldwork for the Future" is closely tied with the University's values and mission as well as goals set forth in the 2021 Strategic Plan for broadening experiential opportunities for students, growing partnerships with community organizations, and providing for our students' success.

The "Students Connected" initiative compliments the efforts of academic programs with built-in requirements that connect students with the workforce.
